'Longest View' of All And Patio Highlighted

Two first impressions of C. W. Hetherly's "Valley View" home, designed by architect Bill Scudder, is its view of Barton Terrace and the home's appealing, protected patio beneath the family room.

The air conditioned home is decorated by Sue Monk with furnishings from Montgomery Ward and Co., in such a delightful way that every visitor will pick up ideas here.

With the "longest view" in the Parade, the home is majestically located on the corner of Briargrove and Cliffside Drives. What's more, almost every room, balcony and protected terrace takes advantage of "The Valley View."

Constructed of fieldstone and near-indestructible cedar siding, the home is trimmed in black, turquoise and grey, a color decor that is carried over into the interior where the ash paneled family room has a massive stone fireplace flanked by twin doors opening onto a broad, western balcony. Vaulted beamed acoustical plastered ceilings and walls-of-windows complete the comfort-picture. Sheet vinyl, here, and throughout the home keynotes quality construction.

The kitchen, as you would expect, has nothing but the finest builtin appliances and cabinet features. A carpeted living room, halls, three bedrooms and



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two baths with builtin vanity-dressing areas keep you abreast of the time. Another unique feature is that each room has a readily accessible outside exit and-or view in two or more directions.

The home's two-car garage is placed on the Cliffside Drive side of the home for easy street entrance. Here, too, you find a third outdoor living area in a small grove of live oaks.
