

'Suburbia South' Exudes Quality

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With a touch of appealing uniqueness that is a hallmark of all Jack Guillett homes, "Suburbia South" presents an appearance that is as interesting from the family side as it is from the curb.

Decorated by John R. Kuchar with furnishings from H. M. Oetting Furniture Co., the air conditioned home literally exudes quality, in good taste, and thoughtful planning.

Working with designer Leon Changler, Jack Guillett started out with fieldstone construction, enhanced by apple-green and white trim, and soaring clear story windows.

The convincing air about "Suburbia South" is purposefully presented with sharp clean lines and sensible planning. The split-level plan fits smoothly on its hillside site and preserves a long western view, plus picking up Austin's skyline that is improved only by gay lights after dark.

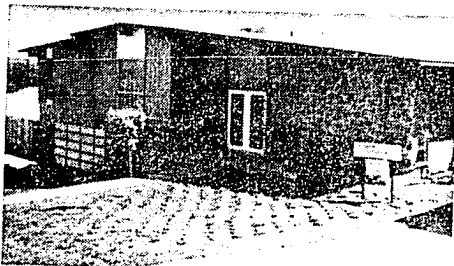
"Suburbia South" guests are ushered into a foyer that leads, left, to four spacious bedrooms and two baths, each with a multitude of builtins. Or, right, to a long carpeted living room that fills the east wing. A straight-ahead route leads to a kitchen and a dining room, both of which take in the Austin skyline. An open stairway leads to the home's lower level activity room with a stone fireplace and large, exposed aggregate patio.

An upper level, walled terrace has an outside stairs that also leads to the patio.

Black, white and gold are predominate colors of the home and each room has a vaulted, acoustical plastered ceiling embraced by a sturdy, black beam.

There's a half-bath off the activity room, plus a laundry room and double garage with workshop.

Jack Guillett's "Suburbia South" is indeed a refreshing pace-setter for modern, tasteful home planning.
